




# Background





# Collaboration leads to successful change in Pacific Island Countries A collaboration between 14 Pacific Island Countries and Australia is empowering nurses and improving compliance with perioperative standards



## The problem is identified

Australian surgical teams visiting Pacific Island Countries noted wide variations in operating theatre nursing practice and highlighted this in trip reports to the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (RACS).

Strengthening Specialised Clinical Services in the Pacific (SSCSiP) identified one underlying cause was a lack of local practice standards for perioperative nurses.

## The collaboration begins

SSCSiP collaborated with the Australian College of Perioperative Nurses (ACORN) and consultants from Health Education & Learning Partnerships (HE&LP) to form a team of nurses and educators representing 14 Pacific Island Countries (PICs) and Australian mid 2015. The project was funded by SSCSiP (supported by the Australian Government). ACORN supported the Australian consultants' facilitation of workshops.

Existing standards were sourced from Australia and the USA, however, these were not fit for purpose in the limited resources settings of the PICs because:

- they did not reflect the diversity of budgets and hospital infrastructures affecting water and electricity supply, laundering and sterilising services; or
- acknowledge challenges in providing safe patient care in facilities with unreliable supply of hand-wash, perioperative attire, covered footwear, surgical masks, eye-protection, surgical scrub solutions, sterile gowns and gloves.

## The team sets aims and objectives

Develop a "bundle" of standards with matching practice audit tools relating to infection prevention and aseptic techniques tailored for use by perioperative nurses in Pacific Island Countries (PICs).

- Provide a process to ensure a voice for all PICs including 3 review cycles to establish consensus
- 2. Produce standards with rationales for practice
- Produce matching practice audit tools to measure compliance and support quality improvement
- Establish a network to support implementation and foster leadership locally across PICs


Approval was granted to use ACORN Standards and Guidelines of the International Federation of Perioperative Nurses (IFPN) as foundation documents from which to develop local standards.

These local standards will be referred to as the Pacific Perioperative Practice Bundle (PPPB).

## Making change happen in the Pacific

The team employed a range of change strategies:

- Implementation workshops, webinars, teleconferences and local in-service presentations
- · Development and display of reminder posters
- · Audit and feedback by monthly email updates
- · Site visits and engagement with local nursing leaders





PPB implementation workshop held 13-18 August 2016, in Sura, Fig. Financial support for he workshop was accorded by SSCS:P (PIC work-insure) and ACORN (Australian Gerillanus).

## Project outcomes emerging

Practice audits have been conducted in four of the Pacific Island Countries (PICs) since implementation.

The Kiribati team conducted 34 individual practice audits between September 2016 and February 2017. Overall compliance was high for aseptic technique at 87%, while perioperative attire was reported as 77%.

Other teams reported improvements with aseptic technique while compliance rates with perioperative attire and protective apparel were affected by hospital laundry services and linen supply.

The PPPB has been accepted as the minimum practice standards for perioperative nursing in PICs. RACS has indicated it will brief nurses and visiting surgical teams on the PPPB. A recent trip report identified positive change in nursing practice, improvements in knowledge and a more consistent application of standards. ACORN has partnered with HE&LP to produce practice audit tools to measure compliance with the ACORN Standards for Perioperative Nursing in Australia.


