1. REGIONAL MECHANISM FOR ACCREDITATION, CPD AND STANDARDS DEVELOPMENT

Following discussion an **SPCNMOA** working group was agreed

- membership to include CNMOs from Fiji, Samoa, Cook Islands, PNG, CNO from Tonga and ANMAC. Support from Australia and New Zealand with experts co-opted as necessary
- To undertake further work on this theme.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR CLINICAL SPECIALISTS AND ADVANCE NURSING PRACTICE

SPC/WHO Director of Clinical Services meeting. This meeting leads into Heads of Health Meeting and recommendations are then presented to Pacific Health Ministers Meeting.

Following discussion, SPCNMOA will **present a paper to SPC** for presentation at Director of Clinical Services Meeting.

3. EMERGING PRIORITIES FOR THE REGION IN LINE WITH UHC, SUCH AS EMERGENCY AND DISASTER PREPAREDNESS, AMR, AND NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES.

SPCNMOA identified a number of key issues including:

The need to **strengthen capacity**, competence and resilience of **emergency disaster nurses** including psycho social support in Pacific countries though a regional program.

The need for a strategic pool of educated Pacific nurses located within region that are mobile and linked to National Emergency Disaster Response Teams

4. STRENGTHEN MIDWIFERY LEADERSHIP WITHIN PACIFIC

SPCNMOA discussed the need for **continued support for midwifery** and the important role it plays in **child and maternal health.**

SPCNMOA Requests SPNF support:

- 1. To approach ICN, to hold an ICN Regional Forum for the Pacific.
- 2. Reinstatement of WHO WPRO Regional Nurse Adviser and
- 3. Creation of a Nursing Advisor position in the Pacific region.
